Learning About Our Past

Rev. Hardies talked on December 4 about Moncure Conway, minister at All Souls from 1854-1856. The Conway Foundation in Falmouth Virginia is planning a gala celebration leading up to a Juneteenth Celebration June 17, 2006. The Foundation shared this with us: Conway's father was a wealthy slaveholder in Virginia, and his mother introduced her son to abolitionism. During the Civil War, Union and Confederate forces displaced the family slaves. Moncure Conway searched and found family slaves in Georgetown. He helped a band of slaves escape to Ohio. The escapees formed the Conway Colony and prospered. We are inviting Foundation members to visit ASC in January. Stay tuned for updates.

The Multicultural Growth Task Force is committed to listening to ASC members reflect on the Intentional Growth Policy adopted by the Board of Trustees this year.
